IX. Adjournment

On September 13, 2022, California Governor Gavin Newsom signed California Assembly Bill 2449 (AB 2449) into law. This bill changes remote attendance rules under Ralph M. Brown Act's opening meeting laws. With an effective date of January 1, 2023, AB 2449 imposes four periods of differing rules on remote access to, and member attendance of, local agency public meetings under the Ralph M. Brown Act (Brown Act). Further, a state of emergency is no longer in effect and so governing bodies will now meet in person with the possibility of approved remote attendance. The public may observe the meeting remotely or in person and offer public comment. A link for remote viewing or calling in is noted on the agenda. Therefore, Academic Senate (AS) meetings will be held in person with a Zoom link available. AAC added language to AP 3710 from AP 3715 regarding Intellectual Property, connecting these two administrative procedures was the only change.

IX. Information

A. VP of Administrative Services - Annual Facilities Plan Update [9:45; 30 minutes]

*Description: The Vice President of Administrative Services will provide an annual Facilities Plan Update. **updated presentation** sent with these minutes.*

VP Elba Gomez and **Kitchell Construction** provided an update on capital improvements, noting that final parts of the plan are on hold until the Educational Plan is finalized in January 2026 to best align the college's needs. Of the \$467 million bond, \$425 million has been accounted for; additional funding will be required to complete remaining projects. Key updates included solar shade structures installed at all three campus locations to take advantage of sunseting state and federal credits, new student and governance spaces at San Elijo, ongoing work on OC4500 and OC4700 under Department of Structural Architecture [DSA] review, and upcoming wayfinding/signage improvements across campus. Senators raised several points of clarification:

Graboi - asked about revenue from lease revenue bonds and expressed appreciation for the new solar grids. Sunny clarified that lease revenue bonds function as loans repaid over time, not as revenue streams. **Page** - asked about planned color-coding of parking lots, follow-up was noted. **Zaman** - inquired about maintenance planning; specifically job classifications in building & maintenance. Sunny confirmed that total cost of ownership, including custodial and IT needs, is factored into projects, though recent positions did not meet the 50% law requirement.

Two follow-up areas were noted: (1) clarification of lease revenue bonds, and (2) faculty awareness of long-term classroom and maintenance planning.

E. 2026-2027 Academic Calendar Adjusted to Meet CCCC Approval - [10:15; 30 minutes]

Description: After the Academic Senate approved Option 1 on August 22nd and the Board of Trustees approved Option 1 on September 11th, the California Community College Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) has taken issue with the FLEX days scheduled on September 8th in the fall and April 29th in the spring and requires further changes to the FLEX schedule prior to their approval.

mittchell - shared context for this item. On September 26th, the Chancellor's Office informed the Office of Instruction that they would not approve the proposed calendar. They said that a compressed calendar does not allow FLEX days to be scheduled within the semester because doing so will reduce the number of total weeks for the year below the minimum 32 weeks required by Title V Sections 58004, and Section 55701. To meet next board agenda in October, Senate has to approve a calendar today. In working with administration, Sullivan and mittchell made adjustments to the calendar by make these changes: September 8th FLEX day moved to August 10th in the fall and April 29th FLEX day moved to January 25th in the spring. Today's vote is to approve the proposed calendar and approve a motion to suspend Academic Senate rules to hear this item as a final vote and move it to the Board.

MSU (Warren/Zaman) to suspend Academic Senate rules for two reads passed

MSP (Cotnoir/Page) Vote: [**Warren abstained, Tamura/Graboi voted no**] to approve item E, 2026-2027 Academic Calendar Adjusted to Meet CCCC Approval

Chairs of PDP, AAC and DEqCC shared how the adjusted calendar will shape programming and development within their committees. **VPI Pescarmona** provided context for the state's decision, explaining that if the calendar configuration risks lowering the college's state funding (apportionment), or places FLEX/non-instructional days in a way that disrupts how apportionment is calculated, the state won't approve it. **President Cooke** stated that CA Community Colleges are highly regulated and yet expected to remain innovative within these constraints. **Krista Warren, President of the MiraCosta College Academic Associate Faculty union**, expressed concern about FLEX days scheduled when associate faculty are off contract. **Mary Gross, President of the Faculty Assembly**, noted that there is overlap between Academic Senate and the FA in this issue and thanked those who worked quickly to address the issue and bring it forward to ensure timely submission to the Board.

AAC Chair Ante-Contreras reported that the committee completed its review of the 375-page Full-Time Faculty Priority Requests document. The AAC issued follow-up questions to five departments, finalized rankings, and voted on the recommended priority list at its most recent meeting. Rationales for each ranking were compiled directly from departmental submissions.

Senators made observations about updated data accuracy, departmental size considerations, and opportunities to provide departments additional time and guidance in preparing future requests. As

a next step, the AAC plans to refine the submission and review timeline to allow for earlier consultation and improved data context in future cycles.

VIII. Discussion/Information

A. CPC Update: New Curriculum Approval Timeline - Fallstrom

Description: The Courses and Programs Committee votes to approve adjustments to the curriculum approval timeline to account for the implementation of a new curriculum management system; CPC is also developing a proposal for a new curriculum review cycle to help regulate the quantity of courses submitted each year.

Discussion: CPC Chair Fallstrom reported a significant increase in curriculum submissions, noting that current workload levels are unsustainable and that committee members do not receive reassigned time for this work. While a curriculum freeze was considered, CPC approved adjustments to the curriculum approval timeline instead. Departments were encouraged to coordinate with their Chairs regarding submission expectations. An exception will allow new course proposals to be reviewed in February 2026 under the current CurriQunet system, after which all curriculum updates will align with the six-year review cycle to support the transition to a new curriculum management system. CPC is also integrating Title 5 revisions and Universal Design for Learning (UDL) standards into Course Outlines of Record by April 2026. **Sullivan** liked the proposal as it is a call to be meaningful, a cultural, pedagogical approach. mitchell acknowledged the great work CPC is doing and appreciated all members of CPC.

B. [Building Better Online Learning Experiences - Julius](#)

Description: Faculty Coordinator of Online Education, Jim Julius, will engage the senate in a discussion about what our students say makes online classes effective and what key barriers students face. The goal will be to reflect on how faculty can create more accessible, engaging, and equitable online learning environments. This is part of the Academic Senate's knowledge-building series focused on areas of student access, learning, and success in scheduled classes.

Faculty Coordinator of Online Education, Jim Julius, facilitated a discussion on improving online learning through accessibility, engagement, and equity. Data show that MiraCosta continues to maintain strong online enrollment (approximately 70%) with positive student feedback emphasizing clear communication, organized course structure, and engaged instruction. The discussion centered

on developing more flexible and responsive instructional models (Hybrid, HyFlex, and asynchronous), strengthening faculty support for course design and online pedagogy, and addressing challenges related to workload, assessment integrity, and student connection to the campus community. Key takeaways included: Continuance of integrated student feedback into course design; clarifying definitions and expectations for Hybrid vs. HyFlex delivery; expand institutional support for online course redesign and proctoring resources; and ensure alignment with upcoming accreditation and Title 5 updates. Senators were encouraged to communicate departmental needs related to online teaching capacity and to contribute ideas for faculty development within the forthcoming *Educator Futures Plan*.

Discussion: Senators Tucker Sade and Davis reflected on the growing challenges of sustaining quality online instruction, emphasizing the need for greater institutional support and recognition of the additional workload involved in creating engaging, authentic online learning experiences.

Senator Cotnoir added creative options such as “stackable” class models that could enhance flexibility and participation. **Senator Page** expressed interest in strategies to foster community and inclusion for students who learn primarily online. **VP Pescarmona** added that MiraCosta’s participation in the *California Virtual Campus Exchange* continues to provide access and enrollment benefits, supported by the *Emergency Conditions Allowance* that sustains funding at pre-pandemic levels. She noted that while the Exchange simplifies student enrollment and financial aid transfer, local efforts must continue to ensure course quality, faculty support, and alignment with institutional planning initiatives.

C. Adult High School WASC Accreditation - Duran

Description: AHS faculty will share results of the Spring 2025 WASC Accreditation visit to engage Senators in discussion about the value of the AHS here at MiraCosta so they can inform their own constituents and students

Joyful Teacher, Erica Duran, reported on the successful Spring 2025 WASC accreditation visit at the Oceanside Community Learning Center. The visiting team, composed of colleagues from other Adult High Schools, commended MiraCosta’s Adult High School for its innovative instructional practices, strong community engagement, and effective use of Hybrid and HyFlex models, noting that these formats are being implemented with high quality and student satisfaction. One member of the visiting team stated, “I want to work here!” The team’s positive feedback highlighted faculty excellence, student success stories, and the program’s ability to foster community and re-engagement among adult learners, including parents completing high school credentials. Duran emphasized that smaller class settings and flexible learning models are key contributors to this success, not to mention dedicated faculty who believe in the mission. Duran would like to continue promoting the value of the AHS across the college, ensuring that its innovative practices and student outcomes are recognized and integrated into broader institutional discussions about access and completion. Final acknowledgements; CLC offers the highest number of HyFlex courses in all of MiraCosta’s campuses, Counselor Adrean Askerneese attended the Spring 2025 AHS graduation and a shoutout to CLC Administrators.

D. Conversation with the Joyful Teacher - Duran

Description: The Joyful Teacher, Erica Duran, will engage the Senate in a discussion of what ought to be cultivated, celebrated, and connected for teachers to teach joyfully right now.

Joyful Teacher, Erica Duran, led senators and others in the room through a game involving pets, one of which was in the room. The game was insightful, bringing awareness to disabilities, accessibility

and discussions on how we can turn challenges into successes by reframing. The interaction was amazing and joyful. A homework assignment was given to each senator and was asked to be completed and returned via email by the next Academic Senate meeting, Friday, November 7th.

ASP MITCHELL announced that the next Academic Senate meeting on November 7 will be held at the San Elijo Campus. Following the meeting, a team of senators will travel to La Jolla to attend the Fall Plenary. MITCHELL highlighted a session of interest titled “*Empowering*”, that he would like senators to attend. Senator WARREN noted that she is no longer able to attend Fall Plenary and has canceled her registration. An opportunity for another senator to attend in her place was offered, with a response deadline of October 21.

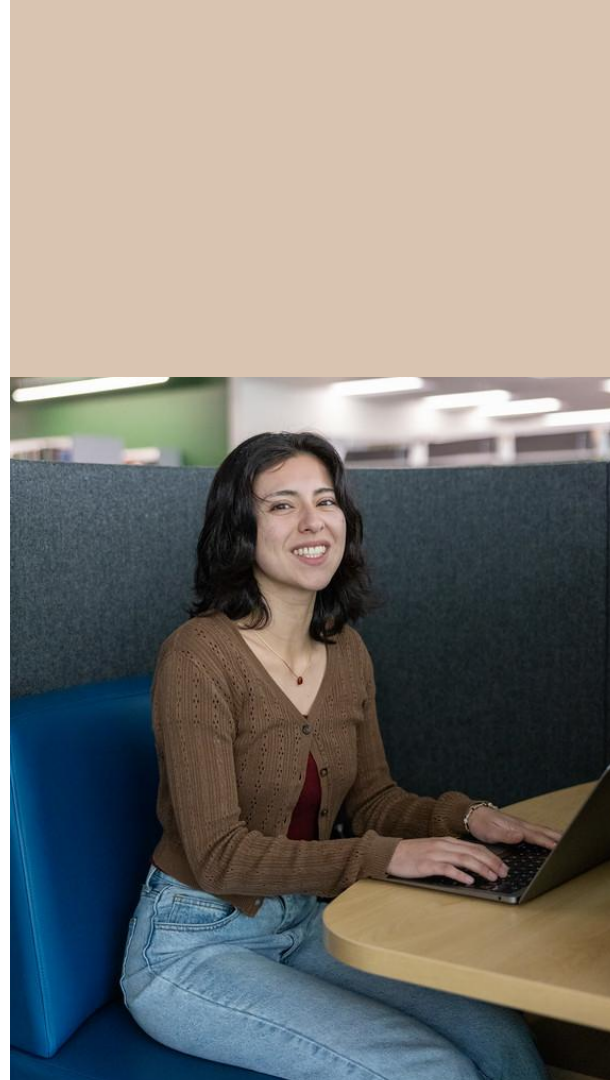
