### I. Call to Order

#### II. Comments/Announcements

### A. College Council

- Board Agenda review budget presentation and facilities update.
- Update on campus climate study pertinent data was reviewed and context was provided.
- Spring 2021 discussion class schedule will mirror fall 2020, being primarily online. Hard to convert classes will be back on campus.
- Redesigning the student experience update –Videos created by success teams in STEM and Social/Behavioral Sciences were shared.
- BP/AP review included collegial governance and post-baccalaureate nursing.

#### B. Fiscal Matters

#### Sacramento Update

- Prop 15 & 16 Prop 15 is polling slightly yes over no. This proposition would roll back some Prop 13 provisions property tax on commercial properties valued over \$3M would be taxed on their value, not on their sale price. 7% of voters are undecided and will make the difference in whether or not it passes. Prop 16 is polling 50/50. This proposition overturns the internal policy regarding the use of race and ethnicity for college admissions screening.
- Budget Update SB820 signed last week by the governor, which authorization the use of Lottery funds on electronics. It also makes the Lieutenant Governor a member of the Board of Governors.

- Assembly member Medina has agreed to author a new baccalaureate degree bill for community colleges. It would make current programs permanent and allow for expansion of programs.
- Transfer Report for CCs The Public Policy Institute of California released a report examining community college transfer progress. The report shows equity gaps which continue to be a big concern.

### A. FY21 Final Budget Presentation

Flood presented the FY21 Final Budget. The presentation is available in the portal on the BPC site.

### MCC Financial Landscape for FY21

- Estimated property tax increase of 5.1%
- CalSTRS and CalPERS annual cost adjustments
- Student success requirements
  - Guided Pathways –Funding is decreasing
  - Student Equity and Achievement (SEA) deferral impacts
- Enhance diversity, equity, and inclusion
- Cost impacts of reacting to COVID-19 Pandemic
- Comprehensive Master Plan, Strategic Plan, and program review needs
- Workday ERP system and Fiscal Independence project:
  - Phase II implementation and ongoing maintenance
- Facilities \$455M General Obligation Bond:
  - 2ndTranche: 2ndseries (Series B) from the approved \$455M General Obligation Bond issued, sale finalized on 9/8/2020
- Increased health care costs of 9%
- 3rd year of Class/Comp implementation
- 50% law requirements will be difficult to achieve

#### Revenue Assumptions

- Anticipate property tax revenue growth slow down, but not as severe as overall state revenue declines.
- \$4.4M deferral of State provided restricted and unrestricted fund revenue deferred
- \$3.75M of Student Equity and Achievement Funds
- \$688K in Apportionment funding
- CARES Act Federal funding of \$5.8M
- COVID-19 Response Grant Funding of \$1.1M
- Loss of one-time allocations
- Loss of local revenue
  - (bookstore, food service, parking fees, ticket sales)
- Loss of enterprise fund revenue
  - o Civic center, bookstore, food service, etc.
- Increase FTES by 1% over FY 2019/20

#### **Expense Assumptions**

"Step and Column" salary increases

- 1% -2.25% negotiated COLA
- 9% Health benefit cost increases
- Hire 10 faculty positions (2 growth, 8 replacements)
- Minimum wage increase from \$13.00 to \$14.00 effective Jan 1, 2021
- Inflation factored in Services for annualized contract adjustments
- Some departmental operational savings from campus closures
- New Facility Master Plan project impacts
- Class/Comp study, final year of 3-year implementation
- CalSTRS rates: From 17.1% to 16.15% (was 18.4%) a decrease of 0.95%
- CalPERS rates: From 19.7% to 20.7% (was 22.7%), an increase of 1.0%
